


A SMALL BUT PERFECTLY FORMED
APARTMENT IS WHAT THIS YOUNG
COUPLE HAD ENVISIONED. USING
THEIR PROFESSIONAL KNOW-HOW
THEY TURNED THIS ATTIC SPACE
INTO A DREAM HOME FOR TWO.
OR THREE.

Cris Bartels and his American girlfriend Renée Habib bought their apartment on Amsterdam's Herengracht in January 2016. The dwelling, situated on the second floor of the rear house, has a beautiful view of the downstairs neighbours' garden. Bartels: "We fell for the mezzanine. It gives the house such character. At approximately 68 m2 (220 square feet) our apartment is one of the smallest in the building. But as our wise neighbour pointed out: 'You're better off with the smallest room in an expensive hotel than the biggest room in a seedy one." Despite its location in the centre of town, it's tranquil. Bartels: "It's almost like living in a village." Habib: "We've got the best of both worlds here. Indoors it's super quiet and outside you feel you live in a city."

They pencilled their first designs for the house on a sketchpad after a few whiskies too many at L&B Whisky café on Korte Leidsedwarsstraat. That evening, Cris even made some financial calculations and wrote in capital letters underneath them: 'stick to it and suck it up.' That turned out to be no mean feat. Creative director Bartels: "As an interior decorator, Renée has a penchant for the most beautiful finishing and materials. Ultimately we had to cut costs in that department." They thought carefully about which materials to use. Habib: "The floors of the apartment used to be covered with carpets and lino. We went for robust materials like wood and natural stone, which are more sustainable and become more appealing over time."

The apartment is freshly finished and not a moment too soon, as Renée has recently given birth to the couple's first child, a' beautiful baby girl. The mezzanine currently serves as a lounge area with a beanbag and books, but now that the baby has arrived Cris and Renée will use this space as their bedroom. The small ladder leading up to it is a unique piece that was made for them by designer and fellow Design Academy alum Maarten Baas. The small steps from the kitchen into the living room – which the couple have nick-named 'Brooklyn' – is the part of the house they both love most. Habib: "When either Cris or I are in the kitchen, the other one will come and sit on the steps. Just like in Brooklyn, New York, where steps have more than one function. I have tried to design the apartment as if it were a city. Including active and peaceful zones." Bartels: "The kitchen is an active zone. The kitchen block is reinforced, so you could even dance on it, although Renée won't allow it."
